the Compass Music and Art Center of Brandon is currently hosting a group art exhibit, featuring 14 Vermont artists. The work is diverse, but earthbound in its focus. Edna Sutton, co-founder of Compass and curator of the exhibit, traveled through the state and invited artists to participate whose work was close to the natural world. She calls the collection, "ArtFULL Vermont."

That said, this exhibit is presented in a way that makes the best of the largest room. The work is hung on moveable walls through the center of the room,

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creating a kind of garden of art through which a visitor can meander.

The show greets visitors in the corridor with a motion-filled hanging by Susan Raber Bray. Its ink drawings float like prayer flags on a breeze, and she used clay to make her fetching sculptures of birds and goats.

The centerpiece of the exhibit within the gallery is a sculptural garment fabricated by Wendy Copp of dried plant materials. The pieces represent the abundant resources in a particular locale and reflect her thoughts about the relationship of humans to natural processes.

A group show of this scope is difficult to describe. Suffice to say that everything works with everything else. The large classical collection of "Gourds as Fine Art" by in some cases, remembering that autumn John Hodgson is represented here, and sings a duet with Copp's large piece.

In this exhibit, you'll find burled wood rebirth as art.

bowls, clay sculptures of birds and contemporary vases all collaborating. Pictorially, you will see the dark reminiscent landscape paintings of John Rivers and for contrast the wildly colorful abstract watercolors of Frieda Post. Stephanie Whitney-Payne contributes her peaceful botanical watercolor paintings.

Two photographers have added their comments on the natural world: Marilyn Maddison and Diane Gabriel. Other artists who join the exhibit are Sharon Lefebvre, Cristina Pellechio, Jeremy Ayers, Ben Barlow, Torrey Carroll Smith and Janet Van Fleet.

Curator Edna Sutton says that the exhibit space has a number of uses, including music performances and dance. When there is an exhibit of art, she tries to create a loft-like feel in the setting with the portable wall surfaces. It makes for an intimate show with surprises around each corner.
